as rain. (Job 36:27-28) These descriptions reflect the modern understanding of the water cycle — evaporation, condensation, and precipitation.

The Mosaic Law contains numerous instructions on sanitation, quarantine, and cleanliness (for example: Leviticus 13; Numbers 19). These practices, such as isolating those with contagious diseases and washing after contact with bodily fluids, are in line with modern principles of infection control and disease prevention.

Genesis 15:5 states that Abraham's descendants would be as numerous as the stars, which in ancient times seemed countable. "Yahweh brought him outside, and said, 'Look now toward the sky, and count the stars, if you are able to count them.' He said to Abram, 'So your offspring will be.'" Today, astronomy confirms that the number of stars is virtually beyond human calculation, reinforcing the Bible's statement.

The Earth's Shape

Isaiah 40:22 refers to God sitting "above the circle of the earth." This phrasing clearly describes the Earth's spherical shape, which was not commonly accepted in many ancient cultures.

The Value of Blood in Life

Leviticus 17:11 says that “the life of the flesh is in the blood.” Modern science recognizes that blood carries oxygen, nutrients, and removes waste — making it essential for sustaining life.

Species Reproduce According to Their Kind

Genesis 1 repeatedly emphasizes that living things reproduce “after their kind.” While this is not a complete biological statement, it aligns with what science observes — that distinct genetic boundaries exist within species.

The Expanding Universe

Isaiah 40:22 also describes God as one who “stretches out the heavens like a curtain.” Modern astronomy affirms that the universe is indeed expanding — a concept that was only discovered by human beings in the 20th century.

Mental and Emotional Health

Proverbs 17:22 says, “A cheerful heart makes good medicine, but a crushed spirit dries up the bones.” Modern psychology and medical science confirm that emotional well-being directly impacts physical health.

While the Bible was never intended to be a science textbook, it speaks with remarkable accuracy about certain aspects of the natural world. Where the inspired Scriptures address observable reality, it often lines up with scientific discoveries — demonstrating that faith and reason are not opposed, but can work in harmony to reveal truth.

Jesus — The Way to Friendship with God

Our Most Important Friend Has a Name

From the earliest accounts in the Bible, God made His name known. In Exodus 3:13-15, when Moses asked God what name he should use to describe Him to the Israelites, God replied: "I AM WHO I AM." And He said, "Say this to the people of Israel: 'I AM has sent me to you.'" God also said to Moses, "Say this to the people of Israel: 'The Lord [Jehovah], the God of your fathers, the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob, has sent me to you.' This is my name forever, and thus I am to be remembered throughout all generations." (*English Standard Version*)

Here, God identifies Himself as "I AM," a phrase linked to His divine name, often rendered as Jehovah or *Yahweh*. This name signifies the Creator's eternal existence, faithfulness, and unchanging nature.

Though some translations have replaced God's name with titles like "Lord" or "God," the original Hebrew text contains the Tetragrammaton (YHWH) nearly 7,000 times. In the King James Version of the Bible, we read in Psalm 83:18, "That men may know that thou, whose name alone is Jehovah, art the most high over all the earth."

This verse shows us that Jehovah's name sets Him apart from false gods. It is not an impersonal designation but an invitation to know Him personally.

Knowing God's name helps create a relationship built on trust and love. Proverbs 18:10 says, "Jehovah's name is a strong tower: the righteous run to him, and are safe." Calling upon Jehovah's name signifies seeking His protection,

guidance, and comfort. It reflects a bond where believers feel secure in His care.

Jesus Himself honored and emphasized the divine name. In His prayer to His Father, He said, “I made known to them your name, and will make it known; that the love with which you loved me may be in them, and I in them.” (John 17:26) By revealing God’s name, Jesus strengthened the disciples’ faith and reinforced the importance of knowing Jehovah as a loving Father.

Knowing God’s name — Jehovah — is not a trivial matter. It bridges the gap between the Creator and His creation, offering believers a personal connection to the Most High. It reveals God’s qualities, stresses His faithfulness, and draws people into a deeper, more meaningful relationship with Him. Just as the ancient Israelites called upon Jehovah for deliverance and guidance, Christians today can confidently rely on His name, assured that He remains the same unchanging, loving God throughout all generations.


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
